Vermont's Recycling & Composting Initiative

Recycling was always a simple idea—keep valuable material that still has use out of landfills. But it got complicated. So some people don't make the effort. But with the passing of the Universal Recycling Law, it's easier and more convenient than ever to recycle. You'll find more bins in more public places and haulers and transfer stations now accept recyclables right where they take your trash.

Now that recycling is more convenient, you may not need another reason to recycle, but here are a few of our favorites:

- **Keeping material from the landfill. We have only one operating in Vermont now, and the more we send to it, the sooner it will fill up**
- **Reducing greenhouse gas emissions. An aluminum can from recycled material requires 90% less energy than one made from new materials.**
- **Whether it is staffing Vermont's Material Recovery Facilities or the development of creative new uses for old materials, recycling is a job creator.**

The Statewide Six. These six materials can now be recycled everywhere in Vermont. But even that causes questions, so here are examples of what can/can't go into the bins.

Paper

Magazines, Newspapers, Mail, Phone books and Mixed paper
but not... Paper towels, Soft tissues
Hardcover books



2

Aluminum

Cans, Foil, Pie Tins & Trays
but not... Aluminum siding, Scrap metal,
Pots or Pans



3

Cardboard

Dry & clean cardboard, Cereal and Cracker boxes
but not... Juice cartons, Frozen food
containers, Greasy pizza boxes



4

Steel

Cans (including tin), Lids, Empty Aerosol cans
but not... Major appliances, Scrap metal,
Pesticide sprays, Paint cans



5

Glass

Beer bottles, Wine bottles, Mason jars
but not... Window glass, Light bulbs,
Ceramic dishes



6

Hard Plastics

Water/soda bottles (remove caps please), Milk jugs, Shampoo bottles
but not... Plastic bags, Styrofoam,
Large plastic toys
