

Notice to Buyer of Institutional, Commercial or Industrial Wood Heater

This Notice is required by Act 50 (2019). This Notice must be signed and dated by the buyer or lessee prior to the sale or lease of any institutional, commercial or industrial (ICI) wood heater to be installed in the State of Vermont.

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NOTICE (please read the following information carefully):

These requirements apply to all ICI wood heaters sold or leased for installation in Vermont.

1. Only the following fuels are allowed to be burned:
 - a. chip wood fuels that have been specified in the owner’s manual and meet the following minimum requirements: moisture content less than 35 percent, inorganic fines less than or equal to 1 percent, chlorides less than or equal to 300 parts per million by weight, ash content no more than 2 percent, no demolition or construction waste, and trace metals less than 100 mg/kg.
 - b. pellets that have been specified in the owner’s manual and graded under a licensing agreement with a third-party organization approved by the EPA and meet the following minimum requirements: consistent hardness and energy content with a minimum density of 38 pounds/cubic foot, maximum length of 1.5 inches and diameter between 0.230 and 0.285 inches, inorganic fines less than or equal to 1 percent, chlorides less than or equal to 300 parts per million by weight, ash content no more than 2 percent, contains no demolition or construction waste, trace metals less than 100 mg/kg.
 - c. cordwood with an average moisture content less than 20%.
2. It is illegal to burn: residential or commercial garbage; lawn clippings or yard waste; materials containing rubber, including tires; materials containing plastic; waste petroleum products, paints, paint thinners, or asphalt products; materials containing asbestos; construction or demolition debris; paper products, cardboard, plywood, or particleboard except that fire starters made from paper, cardboard, sawdust, wax or similar substances for the purpose of starting a fire are allowed; railroad ties, pressure treated wood or pallets; manure or animal remains; salt water driftwood or other previously salt water saturated materials; unseasoned wood; any materials not included in the warranty and owner’s manual and any materials that were not included in the certification tests for the ICI wood heater.
3. An ICI wood heater that meets the definition of an outdoor hydronic heater in §5-204(b) of the Air Pollution Control Regulations is subject to the requirements of §5-204.
4. The ICI wood heater must be operated in conformance with the manufacturer’s operating and maintenance instructions.
