The VOC regulations are federally required by the US EPA with little flexibility. The regulations as proposed meet the federal requirements, but are not more stringent. Failure to comply with these requirements would result in repercussions that would potentially affect federal funding coming to Vermont and impose more stringent permitting requirements for new or modifying air pollution sources. The size thresholds in the regulations exempt small sources.
