## **CPG Application Checklist for Criterion 1(G) - Wetlands**



- □ Site map which includes:
  - $\Box$  The entire parcel(s) boundary(ies).
  - □ Scale, north arrow and legend.
  - □ Limits of disturbance, including line upgrades. Include all project components which would lead to draining, dredging, filling or clearing\*
  - □ Any streams, including intermittent, or other waterbodies.
  - □ If no wetlands were found, include hydric soils and VSWI and Vermont Atlas Advisory wetland layers.

If wetland presence is likely due to site having hydric soils, mapped wetlands, forest land, landowner knowledge etc. also include:

□ A clearly marked investigation area in which entire area was completely searched for wetlands.

If wetlands are found within 50 feet of the limits of disturbance include:

- Wetland delineations with indication of which wetlands extend off the investigation area (displayed as open polygon arrow showing where wetland continues). Do not clip boundary at edge of investigation area.
- □ Unique wetland ID #.
- 50 foot buffers to all wetlands which are on the Vermont Significant Wetlands Inventory (VSWI) map, contiguous to a VSWI mapped wetland, meet a presumption of significance (VWR §4.6), or have been determined by ANR Wetland Program staff to be Class II. Any Class III labeling of the above wetland types is misleading.
- □ Wetland delineation date, and name of consultant. Delineation date should correspond with the growing season (typically May October).
- □ Previous permits and other supporting evidence which may include:
  - □ A site visit report from the VT District Wetlands Ecologist
  - □ A Vermont Wetlands Permit
  - □ ACOE wetland determination forms
  - Photographs

\*Draining means the act of removing water from a wetland leaving it empty, dry or dryer through actions such as ditching. Dredging refers to lowering the bottom elevation or any cleaning, deepening, widening, or excavating, either temporarily or permanently. Filling includes the placing of any material that raises, either temporarily or permanently, the surface elevation of any area. Clearing is the act of removing woody vegetation and includes cutting trees, shrubs and topping trees.
