

Activities to do at Beaver Meadows:

- Go for a hike in the woods
- Enjoy wildlife, maybe you'll see a beaver!
- Bring binoculars to go birding
- Go camping in the woods
- Enjoy the marsh land



The complex of wetlands and associated uplands provide a unique array of community types including habitat for some rare species. The area is remote and therefore of high aesthetic value and easy to protect from surrounding land use.



How to get to Beaver Meadows:

Follow National Forest Road 90, in Bristol, VT. At the end of the road, there is a small parking area where you can leave your car.



Beaver Meadows has at least four community types present including: Dwarf Shrub Bog, Black Spruce Woodland Bog, Emergent/Shrub Marsh, and Hardwood/Shrub Swamp

Hunting and trapping activities can occur in or around the wetland. The wetland provides habitat for species that are hunted and trapped, including beaver, moose, bear, mink.



Bring a hiking pack filled with camping gear to spend a night unplugged with nature!

Data from Keeping Track (wildlife) surveys document the use of the wetland and the surrounding land by the following species of mammal: Bobcat, Black Bear, Mink, Fisher, River Otter, Moose, Coyote, Deer, Squirrel, Hare, Beaver, Weasel, and Chipmunk, Northern long-eared bat (federally endangered) and Little brown bat (state endangered).
